



Sebastopol Community Garden transforming into Sebastopol Urban Farm

The name of the Sebastopol Community Garden being developed at 4-10 Spencer Street has had a name change to Sebastopol Urban Farm, better reflecting the scale of the project. Since our last update we have had some great news, being awarded a \$20,000 grant from the William Buckland Foundation to install a greenhouse. This will allow year-round access to grow food and enable training and participation for the community. We also received \$6,500 for a 'Fruity Forest' from the Buninyong Community Bank. This foraging forest will feature fruit trees including plums,



lemons, quince, persimmon and pomegranate, with an undergrowth of herbs and leafy vegetables including parsley, chard and chives. The grant will also enable installation of some irrigation. You will start to see developments in the Urban Farm, as soils are prepared and spaces are made ready for the new greenhouse. Recently, some Phoenix P-12 Community College students also painted some poles at the site to add a vibrant flash of colour.

The Art of Automation: Is AI Making Human Creativity Obsolete?

As artificial intelligence (AI) becomes increasingly woven into our daily lives, one of its most significant and overlooked impacts is on the creative mind. Al is no longer just writing code or managing tasks; it's now generating poetry, music, artwork, blogs, logos, and even screenplays. And it's doing so in seconds, drawing from vast data sets built on the hard work of countless artists, writers, and creators, many of whom never consented to using their work. This raises a serious question: What happens to human creativity when machines begin to mimic it so convincingly? Renowned media theorist Marshall McLuhan once said, "Every extension of man, especially technological extensions, has the effect of amputating some other part of him." Today, Al may be that extension, amplifying efficiency, but numbing inspiration. Artists who might have spent months or years developing their craft are now seeing their unique styles replicated instantly by algorithms. The originality that once defined human creation is being drowned in a sea of Al-generated content. Researcher Kate Crawford (2021) reminds us that Al systems are "not just technical, but social systems," embedded with power, bias, and consequence.

One such consequence is the rapid erosion of creative professions, often the last bastions of authentic human expression. Programmers, designers, writers, and musicians are watching their industries shift toward automation at a pace few anticipated. Social media platforms like Facebook, Twitter, and YouTube accelerate this transformation. By making Al-generated content freely available and highly visible, they fuel a feedback loop: creators unknowingly train the very systems that may one day replace them. The paradox is striking: the more we share, the more AI learns to imitate us. To be fair, Al offers benefits. It democratizes access, enhances productivity, and can inspire new creative forms. But there's a fine line between assistance and replacement. As philosopher Hannah Arendt warned, when human uniqueness is lost to mass production, society loses more than just jobs; it loses meaning. The creative mind thrives on mystery, struggle, and imperfection, qualities machines cannot truly replicate. Now may be the time to rethink how we use AI, not to overshadow creativity, but to protect and elevate it.

Historically Speaking

The Sebastopol Avenue of Honour - Part II From Cheshunt Street to Birdwood Avenue

In the last issue of this newsletter, we discovered that what we now know as Birdwood Avenue was originally called Cheshunt Street, with the name changed in 1917 as a "compliment" to General Sir William Birdwood. Who was General Birdwood?



The Australian War Memorial describes him in the following way "When the First World War began, Britain's Minister for War, Lord Kitchener, placed Birdwood in command of the Australian and New Zealand forces bound for Europe. Before they reached England, however, the ANZACs, as they would soon be known, were ordered to disembark for training in Egypt. Birdwood met them there in December 1914.

Four months later Birdwood's troops landed at Gallipoli. He impressed the men by regularly visiting the front lines and taking daily swims in the sea, heedless of the danger from Turkish shrapnel aimed at men seeking such refreshment. His bravery earned Birdwood the enduring respect of the AIF, and he was appointed its temporary administrative commander, as well as its operational commander, following the death of General William Bridges in May 1915. The appointment was made permanent in September 1916.

Having watched all attempts fail to make headway against the Turks on Gallipoli, Birdwood was nevertheless opposed to the evacuation when the question was raised. In this he was overruled and he oversaw the successful withdrawal in December 1915. In early 1916 the ANZAC Corps was split in two. Birdwood assumed command of I ANZAC Corps, accompanied it to France, and directed its operations throughout 1916 and 1917.

Birdwood made a point of appointing Australians to command and staff positions but took command of

the Australian Corps when it was formed from the five AIF divisions in November 1917. He was succeeded by Lieutenant General John Monash in May 1918 and took command of the British 5th Army, but still retained command administrative command of the AIF with the support of almost all senior Australian officers. Despite havingcommanded Australians through some of the Western Front's more disastrous actions, Bullecourt being one example, Birdwood continued to be held in high regard. His willingness to support those he commanded, to argue on their behalf and indeed to make it known that he had done so, earned Birdwood a respect from Australians that was given to few British senior commanders.

In 1920 Birdwood was made a general in the Australian Military Forces and five years later was made field marshal. He toured Australia and New Zealand in 1920 to wide public acclaim and was given command of the Indian Army in 1925. He retired from the military in 1930 and was thwarted in his desire to become Australia's Governor-General when the prime minister insisted on the office being held by an Australian. Birdwood died in England in 1951 and was buried with full military honours.

As part of his 1920 tour of Australia and New Zealand he stayed with Captain R.G. Chirnside at Caranballac, outside of Skipton. During his stay he came to Sebastopol and was greeted at the town hall by the St Joseph's Band and the children of Redan and Sebastopol State Schools singing the national anthem. General Birdwood was warmly welcomed by the Mayor and thanked for the many kindnesses he had shown to Australian soldiers. He declined to make a speech preferring to see Birdwood Avenue and meet with the soldiers who had served with him. He did ask the Mayor to help find employment for two soldiers who had approached him and appealed to the students' headmasters to give them a half day holiday, thus cementing his popularity even further.

Vaudeville to the Video Store Exhibition



Since the beginning of the year the Sebastopol Historical Society members have been busy working on an exhibition for the Ballarat Heritage Festival. The festival is a mainstay on the city of Ballarat's events calendar and Historical Society have been contributing for many years. Although the Heritage Festival is over the Society's exhibition will be on display for the remainder of the year. This year's exhibition, Vaudeville to Video Stores followed the Festival theme, History Unfolds, Entertainment Awaits. The exhibition celebrated entertainment in the Borough from the 1860s to its amalgamation in 1994. From the vaudeville performances in local hotels in the 1860s to the introduction of video stores in the 1980s and 90s. The exhibition showcases how people entertained themselves throughout the decades.

Central to the exhibition is local man, Donald Gunn, a born entertainer who raised thousands of dollars for local causes. Donald hosted his first show in his family's woodshed in 1919 and then went on to write and stage musicals and pantomimes. His shows


premiered the Sebastopol Town Hall and were often taken on tour around venues in the wider Ballarat area. He organised concerts, balls. carnivals, Queen baby shows and much more.



The exhibition also features objects from our museum, documents, photographs and costumes, along with demonstrations of early gramophone technology. The museum is located on the ground floor of the old Sebastopol State School at 185 Yarrowee Street, Sebastopol. The museum is open by appointment and on the first Sunday of each month from 1 until 4pm. Upcoming open days are: Sunday 6 July and Sunday 3 August.


